Postal Job Opens Soon

An examination for rural carrier at the Palos Verdes Post Office will be open for acceptance of applications until Aug. 7, the Civil Service Commission said this week. Applicants for the examination must reside within the delivery area of the Palos Verdes Post Office and must have lived in that area for a year prior to the deadline for application. A minimum age of 18 is another requirement, but there is no maximum age limit.

LICENSE FEES CUT

Business license fees for non-resident gardeners and maintenance workers in the city was lowered from \$50 to \$24 by the Council on the recommendation of Licenses Inspector Gale Whitacre.
