## Four Top All-Star Teams Seek Title

Semi-final and final District 3 Little League tournament play matches the Peninsula All-Stars against the Torrance American All-Stars this evening, and the Lomita-Harbor City All-Stars versus the Torrance National All-Stars tomorrow evening, with the winners of these semi-final games meeting for the district title Saturday. All games to be played at Dominguez Field.

In today's game Torrance American represents Area 2 on wins over Torrance Pacific, 9-2, and North Torrance, 9-0. The Area 1 champion Peninsula All-Stars have recorded wins over Rolling Hills, 4-3, and Palos Verdes, 2-0.

**Nationals Beat East Lakewood, 3-2**  
Home runs by Jack Caganan and Steve McGuire provided enough power to give the Torrance National All-Stars a 3-2 win over the East Lakewood stars at East Lakewood last weekend.

Bruce Smith went the route for the Nationals on the mound to take pitching credit for the local's first Little League tournament win.

Terry Gresson and Ray Wilson teamed up to put out one East Lakewood fire with a sharp double play, Gresson scooping up a hot grounder, tagging second to force the East Lakewood base runner, then lining the ball to Wilson at first for the second out.

The National All-Star starters were: Bruce Smith, pitcher; Steve McGuire, catcher; Ray Wilson, first base; Terry Gresson, second; Larry Anderson, shortstop; Newell Robinson, left field; Howard Taylor, third base; Pete Moore, center field; Jack Caganan, right field.

Next game for the Nationals is tomorrow evening at Dominguez Field against the Lomita-Harbor City All-Stars. Game time is 5:30 p.m.

## CAIRNS TWIRLS 9-0 NO HIT WIN

Torrance's American Little League All-Stars took the Area 1 title and moved into the District 3 semi-finals with ease Saturday on Jim Cairns' 9-0 no-hit win over the North Torrance All-Stars at Dominguez Field.

Cairns' near perfect game, only three NT batters reached first, was coupled with another demonstration of slugging prowess on the part of Bob Kittell, Tom Standley, Phil Nicholson, and the winning pitcher, who came through with five home runs. Nicholson's big bat accounted for two of the round trippers.

Two of the three North Torrance players to draw walks were put out before they could reach a scoring position, Joe Castorena caught stealing second in the fourth, and Jeff Bell nabbed at third in the fifth.

The American sluggers struck three times in the game. Nicholson hit his first out-of-the-park ball in the initial frame with Walker and Kittell on. In the third inning Kittell and Cairns each lofted one out of the field and Nicholson pounded another over the fence.

In the fourth inning, the last in which the fatal foursome appeared, Standley clouted his round tripper with Cairns on base.

Nick Hanlon started on the mound for North Torrance and was relieved in the third inning by Cary Hubert.
