Seventy-three will re-ceive their first teaching exceive their first teaching ex-perience this fall. The prac-tice of employing a signifi-cant number of qualified eeachers new to the profes-sion each year adds the new ideas, modern training, and youth and enthusiasm of college graduates to the maturity and experience of the existing staff, school officials

claim.

Teachers recruited from outside California represent almost every state of the union and a few from the Dominion of Canada. The majority hall from our neighboring states in the Middle West.

According to Robert C. Morton, director of personnel for the school district, it will be necessary to secure over 50 additional teachers to train children of new resulents expected to move into Torrance during the school year.

On Sept. 13 approximately 2285 kindergarten children will report to their classrooms, for the first time. The second day is also a one-hour session. One teacher works with the children while the parents meet with another kindergarten teacher to discuss the kindergarten program.

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During this orientation period teachers impress upon parents that the job of education, beginning in the kindergarten program, is one which the home and school must do together.
