Crime and Punishment

Crime and Punsament
For an offense to become
a crime in California, lawmakers must clearly define
it in our written laws; and
attach a punishment to it.
Our constitution forbids
"cruel and unusual punishment" like torture or lingering death.

ing death.

As punishment the law
may keep a person from enjoying any office of honor;
it may oust him from office;
it may fine or imprison him.

And the law may punish
by death such "capital"
crimes as first degree murder, treason, lying to a court

when the lie brings about an innocent person's execu-tion, wrecking a train, dead-ly assault with malice afore-thought by a prisoner under life sentence, and for kid-naping where the victim re-ceives harm,

In man's long history of violence and crime, he has used many theories of pun-ishment.

ishment.

Today, California's Adult
Authority sets the prison
terms of many who commit
felonies, but even at this
date, we still dispute the
grounds for punishment:

wandon service.

even for the offense against society? An eye for an eye. Shall we mete out equal punishment for those who commit the same crimes? The same for the first offender? For the young offender? For the habitual criminal?

Shall we punish to 'scare others away from crime? Shall we punish to restore the criminal to useful life? Does punishment in fact deter and restore? Are there crimes—like treason in the midst of war—so helnous that we punish the crime? Or do we punish the crime? Or do we punish the crime? Or do we punish the crime hal with some view of his nature? What are the purposes of punishment anyhow, and which purposes are valid?

These are big questions which go beyond the law and invade questions of social policy. If we have not yet settled some of them, it may help to know that these questions have recurred in Western thought for thousands of years.
