Indian Youth To Benefit by Special Gifts

Better educational and health facilities for America's Indian young people is the ob-jective of a special offering to which members of the Tor-rance Seventh-day Adventist Church will contribute on Sat-urday.

A co-educational boarding school for Navajo and other Indian youngsters at Holbrook, Ariz., and Monument Valley, Utah, are two projects which will benefit from the offering according to Pastor Glenn L. Goffar.

The Holbrook school annually provides educational opportunities for some 125 students, ranging in age from six to twenty. Because of lack of facilities, hundreds more have to be turned away each year from the 10-grade school, established in 1947 by the Adventist denomination.

Students, mostly Navajos, come to the school from pagan homes where devil worship is still practiced, unable to speak, read or write English, and teachers have to teach these youngsters English first. There are some 14,000 schoolsage Navajos alone in Arizona and Southern Utah for whom there are no school facilities. The special offering will help to correct this problem.

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The church's Monument Valley Mission provides medical help for thousands of Navajos in this remote Utah area. Tuberculosis is still a scourge, as is malnutrition, and the infant mortality rate is high. Marvin and Gwen Walter, an ordained minister and registered nurse, operate the mission which they founded in 1950.

The special Saturday offering will be used to provide more help to these Americans, long neglected by society, Pastor Goffar commented.

At the 11 o'clock worship service, there will be service of baptism and reception of new members. Parents wishing to have children baptized should call the church office during the week.



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


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
