Disability Payments Under Social Security Starting

Disabled veterans may have heard about total disability payments which will be made under the Social Security Act, to persons between the ages of 50 and 65 who can no longer work for a living. Actually this benefit will not start until July 1957, said Mrs. Helen K. Dill, director of the Torrance area Veterans Service Center today.

She warned, too, that when Social Security disability payments start, the amount of other federal disability benefits—including compensation and pension—is to be deducted from the person's disability entitlement under the Social Security law.

"There is another serious question about this benefit," continued Mrs. Dill. "The Veterans Administration counts Social Security as income when it decides whether a veteran is entitled to a non-service-connected pension. Since the Social Security Administration is supposed to deduct the veteran's pension in computing his Social Security disability pay, some veterans may be caught in a squeeze play unless the law is interpreted to prevent an injustice from happening."

In any event, Mrs. Dill strongly urged totally disabled veterans (those unable to work for a living) to take advantage of the Social Security "disability freeze."

This is a means of immobilizing a person's Social Security earning record. Unless this is done, the period in which he is disabled and receives little or no earnings must be included in computing old age benefits when he reaches retirement age. This means his monthly benefits then will be smaller than it would have been if he had applied for the "freeze."

Franklin Says District Enjoys Most Prosperity

Charles A. Franklin, 17 District Congressional Nominee, recently met with Secretary of Labor James Mitchell, to congratulate the nation's labor leader on the fine work which the Eisenhower administration has accomplished in behalf of all working men.

Franklin told the Labor Secretary that never in the history of the area has the 17th District seen such prosperity.
