high schools. This year, about \$3,000,000 of these bonds funds would be available. Override Tax Asked
The second proposal which will appear on next Tuesday's ballot, the '75-cent override tax, must be passed by simple majority of the local electors. The proposed loan would only provide cash for actual construction of buildings for the new schools, but would not include equipment needed for teaching. This tax increase would provide the money for these facilities.

these facilities.

It would also provide more cash for teachers' salaries, which in Torrance have fallen slightly behind Los Angeles, Long Beach, and other schools in this area. Educators feel that salaries must keep pace if the most capable teachers are to be hired for Torrance children.

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School officials pointed out that Torrance has the lowest tax rate of any school district in this area—\$3,10— and has been one of the last districts to raise its tax ceiling.

Costs Increase
Rising costs of operation must be met, school officials declare, since state and federal funds are allotted on a fixed ration. The average cost of educating a high school student is about \$400, while the cost for an elementary pupil is about \$232.

While the assessed valuation in Torrance—the basis upon which school funds are allotted—has gone up, the school population has grown faster. In 1934-55, the average per pupil was \$6202, while this year the average has dropped to \$6568. This loss, officials say, must be met.

Measures Endorsed

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The two measures have been endorsed by the Torrance Industries Tax. Committele; Chamber of Commerce; Executive Board of the Torrance Women's Club; Lionesses; Oil, Chemical, and Atomic Workers Union; Steelworkers' Union; and all of the PTA's.
