Appointments For Military Schools Open

Congressman Cecil R. King announced yesterday his office is prepared to accept applications from young men of the 17th District interested in taking examinations for possible entrance to the Armed Services Academies.

Vacancies will exist at the Military Academy at West Point but not at the Naval Academy. The Air Force Academy at Denver will again use the state-wide competitive examination system, through which 21 young men will be selected from California on the basis of their grades in a series of medical, aptitude and college entrance examinations. Congressman King will nominate 10 qualified applicants desirous of taking these examinations.

Applications Due Jan. 31
Applications must be made in time to be processed by Jan. 31, 1957, since school years begin the following July.

Candidates must be unmarried, male citizens of the United States who will be 17 years old by July 1, 1957, but who will not have become 22 years of age by that date. Height should be between 5 feet 6 inches and 6 feet 4 inches, with weight in proportion to height. Education should be equivalent to graduation from a secondary school with good grades.

Must Live in District
Applicants must be bona fide residents of the 17th Congressional District.

Those interested should write to Congressman King's office, 1125 House Office Building, Washington 25, D.C., stating name, address, and birthdate, and outlining their scholastic accomplishments and class activities, as well as any ROTC participation.

Planners OK Zoning for New Commercial Development Here

The way was paved for what city officials hope may be a large shopping center in the area bounded by Hawthorne Ave., Sepulveda Blvd., Carson St., and Madrona Ave., as the Torrence Planning Commission Wednesday night recommended a proposed rezoning of the area.

The Planners recommended a C-3 zone (unrestricted commercial) for the area. This zone will not permit any residential development as will the C-2 zoning originally proposed. The matter will now go before the City Council, which is expected to set a date for a hearing on the question this Tuesday night. The hearing probably will be on Nov. 6.

At the Planning Commission hearing Wednesday, no protests were received.

Saxons Lose Again

The North High Saxons absorbed their third straight loss of the season Friday night when the Millikan Rams ran over the locals by a 26-6 count on the winner's field.

North High's ground-hugging single wing offense operated briefly in the second quarter when the Saxons drove to their only touchdown, with Ernie Thompson fighting his way around the Ram's end for 16 yards and the score.

David Faulkner Dies

David S. Faulkner, retired vice president of the National Supply Co. and a pioneer Torrence industrialist, suffered a heart attack and died at his Los Angeles home Thursday following a brief illness.

Mr. Faulkner, known to his associates as "Dave," has been a colorful figure in the petroleum industry for more than 40 years. He came to Torrence as an engineer for the Union Tool Co., the city's first industry, and was active in establishing his company here. He remained active in the community's growth and prosperity, and his important contribution to the city earned for him the often used title of "Mr. Torrence."

Registration Soars

The number of registered voters in Torrence has zoomed up by 9264 since last June's primary according to figures released this week by Benjamin S. Hite, county registrar of voters.

Of the total city registration of 35,253 voters for this November's presidential election, 20,716, or 58.8 per cent registered as Democrats, while 13,103 or 37.2 per cent picked the GOP. Of the rest 1144 or 3.6 per cent declined to state a party; 276 registered as miscellaneous parties, and Prohibitionists claimed nine voters.

Rescue Try Fails

Despite hour-long attempts by firemen to revive her, a 25-year-old Torrence woman, Shirley Marie Walker, died early Friday morning, apparently of post-polio complications.

Miss Walker, who lived at 23126 Falena Ave., had suffered a polio attack some months ago and had apparently been recovering until her attack Friday morning. When firemen arrived, her father, Levi Walker, was administering artificial respiration. Resuscitator equipment failed to revive her, although 3600 pounds of oxygen was used.

New GOP President

Robert L. Aguilar, longtime Torrence resident, has been elected president of the Torrence Republican Club. He was elected to succeed Harry Harranan.
