

CITY TO GET \$90,000 SALES TAX IN QUARTER

The State Board of Equalization has certified to Controller Robert C. Kirkwood the sum of \$14,373,648 for distribution to seven counties and 70 cities whose locally imposed sales and use taxes were administered by the State Board during the second quarter of 1956.

This distribution will bring the total amount of such payments to date to \$21,888,967. Except for the sum of nearly a half million dollars which is being withheld pending further information on the local jurisdictions entitled to it, and such unreported amounts as may be discovered by audits, this completes the distribution of local taxes on transactions occurring in the second quarter of the year.

By far the largest recipient of payments is the City of Los Angeles, which is receiving \$7,074,999 this month and has received \$9,215,638 since the controller made his first distribution in August. Next largest participant is Los Angeles County, with \$2,016,301 share in the current distribution and a cumulative share of \$2,782,430.

The City of Torrance is receiving \$90,482.55 this month and has received \$127,990.29 since the beginning of the program.

Amounts May Vary

Second-quarter transactions produce just about one-fourth of the annual tax yield in most counties, so the revenue to be anticipated by the seven counties and 70 cities whose taxes will be state-administered for the whole 1956-57 fiscal year is approximately \$90 million. Individual cities and counties board statisticians warned, may receive more or less than four times the amounts distributed to date because of seasonal variations in trade and because some have disproportionately large or small amounts tied up in the half-million-dollar fund that is not yet ready for distribution.

The seven counties have received 16 1/2 per cent of the payments made to date, and the cities have received the other 83 1/2 per cent. Most cities' percentage shares in the October distribution were larger than their shares in prior distributions because taxpayers who file quarterly tax returns rather than monthly returns tend to be more heavily concentrated in cities than in unincorporated areas. Prior distributions have been based solely on monthly tax returns.
