An opportunity to take a youngster's hand and help him in his fight to prolong life is being offered Southern Californians during the third annual Christmas Parade of Towns, benefitting the Children's Wing of the City of Hope at Duarte.

Governor Goodwin J. Knight is honorary godfather for the event, which extends from Oct. 15 to Dec. 31. In a recent message, Governor Knight urged all Southland residents to "share in this dynamic, humanitarian effort to aid children stricken with catastrophic disease."

Costs Run High
 Knight pointed out that in the Children's Wing of the free, nonsectarian City of Hope, the average cost of care for each child for one day is \$40—an amount which is often doubled or even tripled in complex cases—and that one month's care represents a minimum cost of \$1200.

Calling upon social, civic, and church groups, as well as service clubs and fraternal organizations to join his "Committee of Guardians" for the Children's Wing, he explained that such groups — and individuals, too — were being asked to underwrite specific days of care for children suffering from leukemia, or allied diseases.
