Walsworth as a guest. Mrs. Walsworth is coordinator of the Harbor District Mental Health Service which serves 22 local communities including the South Bay area.

The Harbor District Mental Health Service is a part-party community mental health clinic.

ic, a branch of the Los Angeles State Mental Hygiene Clinic. This is a pilot clinic which is in dire need of community support. At this meeting, Mrs. Walsworth will discuss the urgent requirements to maintain this clinic and the potential of securing additional badly needed clinics to serve special needs in this locality.

Mental illness is the number one health problem in the United States today. At present more children, men and women are in mental hospitals than in all other hospitals combined. The chances of being hospitalized with a severe mental illness are now nearly one in 10.

Single-handed you can do very little about starting a research project, training more experts, getting hospitals to give proper therapy, or establishing a clinic. But, together with other people in the community, you can do every one of these things; said Mrs. Frank Callahan, Hi-Liter officer.

All residents of the bay area and representatives of all clubs, organizations or interested groups are urged to attend this informal discussion in an effort to learn more about mental health and what you can do to improve existing conditions.
