

INGLEWOOD HANDS TORRANCE 13-9 LOSS

Early 9-0 Lead Lost By Tartars

After grabbing a quick 9-0 lead in the first quarter, Torrance High's Tartar varsity seemed unable to master Inglewood's offensive patterns and were handed a 13-9 Bay League loss on the home grounds Friday night. The loss was the fourth suffered by the locals this season.

Torrance's first score came after they took the opening kick-off and drove to the Inglewood 46-yard line before being forced to punt to the visitors 15. There a clipping penalty set the Sentinels back to their one, where they failed to move the ball. With a fourth and six situation a bad pass from center forced the Inglewood punter out of his end-zone for a Torrance safety.

Long Drive
On the following kick-off the Tartars took over on their own 43, and proceeded to drive all the way in eight plays to push across another score. The drive featured alternating runs by halfback Bob Grajada and fullback John Emory, with Emory making a key nine-yard run around end to the Inglewood one yard line. On the next play the plunging Tartar fullback bulled his way into the end zone for the touchdown.

Grajada ran for the extra point to give the locals a 9-0 lead.

A punting duel monopolized most of the second period as both clubs failed to put together a drive. Late in the quarter Inglewood took over on the Torrance 44-yard line and drove to the local's 27 in two plays. A completed pass from that point was good for the score. The try for the extra point was no good, and the half ended with Torrance on the top end of a 9-6 count.

In the second half the Torrance attack bogged down completely, as the Sentinel defense stiffened. The Tartars were able to move for only two first downs in the final two periods, netting six yards rushing and 48-yards passing.

Had a conversation with Dr. Hull recently. Topic of discussion was the organization of the Torrance Booster Club and questions concerning a "de-emphasis of athletics in the Torrance area."

Up-shot of the first part of the conversation, the booster group, was that Dr. Hull stated that he personally would not oppose the formation, and operation of such a group in Torrance provided that this organization be initiated locally, that the organizers publicly lay out a list of definite objectives, and that these objectives be compatible with those of the school district.

Hull stated that it would be possible for a group to make use of school facilities, for meeting purposes, etc., but that such arrangements would have to be made by the group's leaders and the principals of the school involved.

When asked on what grounds he would oppose a booster group Hull remarked that such an organization would be objectionable if it attempted to include any type of program which would be in conflict with the aims of the Torrance Unified School District, as authorized by the local Board of Education.

He also said that if it seemed possible that the group had been instigated by persons not residing in Torrance, and without the interests of the Torrance district in mind, the movement would meet with his objections.

Concerning the de-emphasis rumored locally, particularly in terms of the local high schools' abbreviated football schedules, Dr. Hull said that the Torrance situation merely reflects a growing trend toward eight-game schedules throughout the California Inter-scholastic Federation.

stopped by a fighting Torrance line. Key plays in the stand were made by Mike Bertelet, Bill Montgomery and Bob Curran.

The stand went for naught however, as Torrance was unable to move the ball and on a short punt, Inglewood took over on the Tartar 31-yard stripe. An attempted end run lost four yards but on the next play the Sentinels threw long for the go-ahead score. The conversion was good, and Inglewood took a 13-9 lead to end the scoring.

Errors Exchanged
Fourth quarter play featured an exchange of errors as two Inglewood aerials were picked off by Mick Babbitt and Larry Denning, and a Torrance fumble was recovered by the Sentinels.

A long, time consuming, Inglewood drive in the final minutes of play carried the invaders to the Torrance goal line, but a fumble on the final plunge was recovered by the Tartars in their end zone to give them a final chance with less than a minute to play.

From first and 10 on the 20, Torrance was thrown back to their six, a pass fell incomplete, and on the final play of the game, a screen pass thrown by Babbitt to Emory was stopped on the 31-yard line.

Saxons Stopped, 25-0 by Beverly

Four intercepted passes, two turned into touchdowns, in the first half of play spelled defeat for the North High Saxons as they fell before an undefeated and untied Beverly Hills Norman eleven, 25-0, in a Pioneer League game played at the Norman's stadium, Friday afternoon.

Top marks for Saxon play went to halfback Ernie Thompson, fullback Jim Whitley, end Bill Gipson and center Al Bledsoe.

Beverly opened the scoring late in the first quarter after taking in an errant Saxon aerial, and converting the break into a six-point lead. The attempted point was no good.

The second Norman score also followed an interception, while the third came after a North High punt was partially blocked.

The strongest Saxon threat came in the third quarter when a pass and lateral combination, with Bledsoe winding up with the ball, carried to the Norman 13-yard line. The surge folded however, as the alert Beverly defense picked off another pass on their own two-yard stripe.

On the next play from scrimmage the North High hopes faded as a line play was good for 40-yards, carrying the ball well out of the danger zone.

Final period play was even, with neither team able to put together a sustained drive, as liberal use was made of substitutes.

The Torrance defense was stout, holding the Inglewood team to a minus 26 yards on the ground. At the same time, the locals garnered 78 yards rushing.

The local lads completed two passes for 17 yards, while Inglewood completed six of 20 passes for 63 yards through the air.

The tie marred an otherwise perfect record so far for the Tartarbabes.
