

## St. James Plans Observance of Golden Jubilee

A golden jubilee will be observed on Nov. 10 and 11 at St. James Catholic Church, Redondo Beach, which serves part of Torrance.

The church, located at Pacific Coast Hwy. and Vincent St., will hold a bazaar and parish dinner. The first baptism was recorded 50 years ago at a little Dominguez chapel on the ground where St. James Parochial School now stands.

New Church Planned

The present church was built in 1914. Plans for a new church are being made, since eight masses are celebrated each Sunday because of crowded conditions.

St. James, called the "mother church" in this area, takes in part of Torrance. Boundaries extend from the ocean to Hawthorne Ave., taking in the new southwest housing tract and runs from Pier Ave. to Sepulveda Blvd to Pier Ave. in Hermosa Beach. The Pier Ave. north boundary extends to Dominguez Rd., thence to Dominguez Rd. and out Dominguez Rd. to Hawthorne Ave., Torrance.

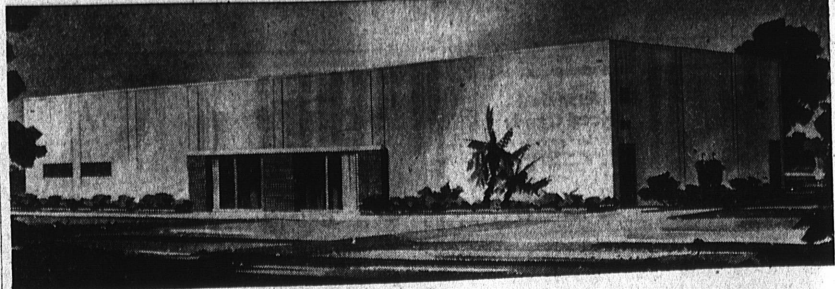

Pastor of St. James parish, the Rev. J. Augustine O'Gorman, is a former Army chaplain and has served several pastorates before coming to Redondo Beach. Assistant pastor is the Rev. John McKenna. Father McKenna served as a G.I. during War II.

## ALONDRA METHODISTS IN BUILDING CAMPAIGN

More than two-thirds of the \$75,000 in pledges needed for the new building fund at Alondra Park Methodist Church, 3153 W. Compton Blvd., Gardena, have been received, church officials reported.

By the end of the first week of visitation on members and Sunday school families, more than \$50,000 had been pledged for the 36-month period beginning Dec. 1, according to W. Woodward Dunlap, general chairman of the campaign, and the Rev. Earl W. Isbell, pastor.

Drive Ends Monday

Plans to end the visitations by next Monday, as some 450 families will have been contacted.

The \$75,000 goal was set for a bank loan to finance construction of a new social hall

Dunlap said, to raise money and Christian Education building, which cost about \$70,000. Plans for the building were developed by the church building committee, headed by Robert Martin, and designed by Architect James Van Dyke.

Construction is expected to begin as soon as the bank loan is negotiated, which should be within the next 30 days, Dunlap said.

Part of Master Plan

The social hall and Christian education building are part of a master plan of expansion for the church set up two years ago. Martin said the social hall will be used for Sunday school classes and many other youth clubs, activities — youth troops, clubs, and Scout troops. It will also be used for adult activities.

Division leaders for the campaign include Arthur and Ann Randall, Chuck and Juanita Hippler, Gene and Jerry Spohn, Leo and Beverly Hahn, Buff and Katherine Chase, and Mike and Macy Kissinger.

Each division leader has from 12 to 16 persons who call in couples drawn from the membership and Sunday school families.

## Rabbi Stern Will Speak Tomorrow

Rabbi S. Shalom Stern has accepted the invitation to be the guest rabbi of Temple Menorah, 112 1/2 N. Catalina, Redondo Beach, at Friday evening sabbath services, tomorrow at 8 p.m.

Rabbi Stern, who has served as a rabbi in Ventura and Salinas, Calif., and was an Army chaplain during World War II, has chosen as his sermon, "The Doctrine of Election" from a theological standpoint, in view of the Nov. 6 elections.

Rabbi Stern is the first of a series of seven guest rabbis who will occupy the pulpit once a month at Temple Menorah, Friday, Dec. 7, Rabbi Albert Lewis of Temple Isaiah in Los Angeles will be the guest rabbi.

## 'Adam, Fallen Man,' Is Topic This Sunday

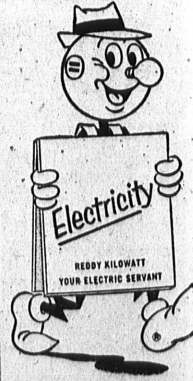
The Lesson-Sermon "Adam and Fallen Man" in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, Sunday, is headed up by the Golden Text from Hosea (14:1), "O Israel, return unto the Lord thy God; for thou hast fallen by thine iniquity."

After the accounts of the creation of man in the early chapters of Genesis, there appears the challenge of the voice of God to Adam. The account reads, "And the Lord God called unto Adam, and said unto him, 'Where art thou?' And he said, 'I heard thy voice in the garden, and I was afraid, . . . and I hid myself.'" (Genesis 3:9, 10).

"Above error's awful din, blackness, and chaos, the voice of Truth still calls: 'Adam, where art thou?'" reads a passage from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy. It continues, "Consciousness, where art thou? Art thou dwelling in the belief that mind is in matter, and that evil is mind, or art thou in the living faith that there is and can be but one God, and keeping His commandments?" (p. 307).
