United Nations and have our two Allies veto it." "Canada last evening spoke of a plan to endeavor to re-establish borders in the warring area and have the borders patrolled. This very same thing Adlai Stevenson said one year ago," said Mrs. Roosevelt.

### Leadership Sought

Speaking on civil rights, Mrs. Roosevelt stated the Democrats have had a better record on civil rights than the Republicans.

"It is important that we do our job and see to it that all of our citizens have equal opportunity. Two-thirds of the people in the world are colored and they are looking to us for leadership," Mrs. Roosevelt stated.

"I think in Senator Estes Kefauver you'll have a better vice president than you have in Nixon," Mrs. Roosevelt told the chuckling audience.

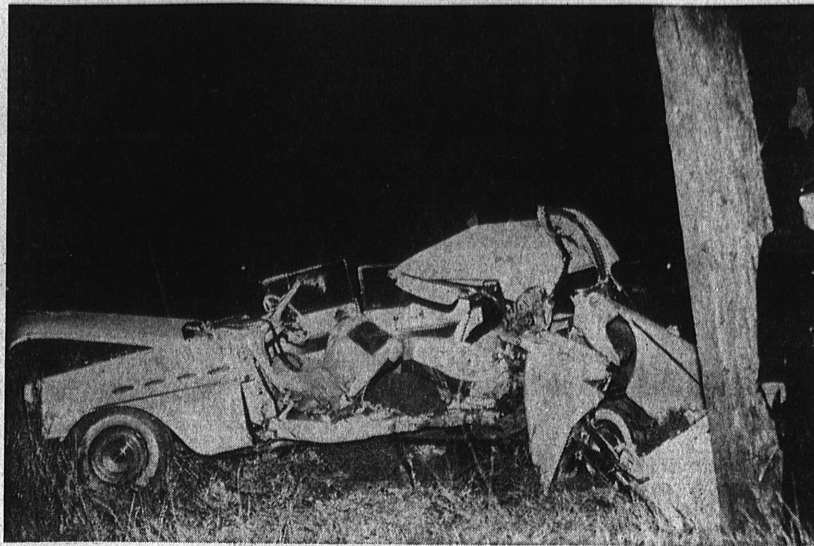
### Receives Ovation

"On election day I hope you will give this country good leadership and good backing," Mrs. Roosevelt encouraged.

Mrs. Roosevelt was escorted into Torrance by the Torrance Police department.

She was escorted from her car to the hall by Mayor Albert Isen. She entered the hall to a standing ovation lasting approximately five minutes. Minutes later her son, James, entered to a standing ovation.

Although the "trick-or-treaters," thousands of them, were out mainly for "treats," a few vandals damaged homes, cars, and trees.

Mrs. Harry Lindley, of 319 Paseo de Gracia, reported damage to floor and carpeting when hoodlums flooded her home by putting a garden hose through a mail slot. A similar incident was related by Mrs. Carroll Schulz, of 3308 W. 189th St.

Ed Kennedy, of 17310 Wilton Pl., said that red paint was smeared on the outside of his dwelling.

A station wagon used by the City Recreation Dept. was sprayed with black paint while it was in a parking place near City Hall.

Bob Robinson, of 5106 Le-nore St., reported that a tire

on his car was slashed. More than a dozen small trees were torn down or damaged and fire hydrants were turned on at a score of locations throughout the city.

Any residents of the area near Riviera School who saw a seven-foot figure marching down the streets last Halloween night, with strange noises coming from it and its eyes flashing, can relax.

It wasn't a creature from Mars, a bird, a plane, or even Superman. It was Mitty, the friendly robot, a creation of young Tom Pettepiece, neighborhood inventor.

**Odds and Ends Used**  
Using some scrap wood, cardboard boxes, some electrical equipment, and other odds and ends, Tom, who lives at 5513 Calle de Ricardo, created his own robot, "just because I always wanted to."

The robot already has been star attraction at several parties. By means of lights on its chest, Mitty can answer "yes" or "no" questions and can speak in Morse code. Tom crawls inside his creation and manipulates the electrical equipment by means of a small switchboard inside.

Tom wants to be either an engineer or a pilot, is a jack-of-many-hobbies, including his robot building, chemistry, printing, and baseball.

At Mitty's performances, Tom hands out small circulars, which say, "Thank you, folks." The small cards are printed by young Pettepiece on his own small press. He also makes signs which he hangs all over his room and on his door, including one which says, "Don't go away mad, just go away."

The robot is named Mitty, after a character portrayed by Danny Kaye, one of the boy's favorite actors.

Tom's father, Bill Pettepiece, is an engineer and helped the lad "a little bit" with his robot. Tom is a seventh grader at Riviera School.
