## Valley Firm Offers Stock in Hexagonal-Type Market Chain



**DELAMART TO EXPAND**—Operators of this unique market at 14103 Victory Blvd. are offering stock to public and plan to build minimum of four more stores in Valley area. Hexagonal design permits easy shopping with minimum of help and delay for customers, owners report. Present market has been operating in Van Nuys for four years.

Officials of Delamart Inc., operator of a new type "superette" food market, today had reported the firm is offering to the public 135,000 shares of its capital stock at \$1 per share.

Proceeds will be used to construct a completely equip a minimum of four modern stores in the most densely populated areas of the Valley, probably in Van Nuys, North Hollywood and Burbank.

Will Use Conveyors  
These new Delamarts will be larger than the present one at 14103 Victory Blvd., which also will be remodeled in a few months to allow for wider aisles and more refrigeration and will include a large reach-in type of refrigerated box for the display of dairy products and beverages.

All stores will have the latest conveyor belt type check stands to expedite customer service.

This completely new type of neighborhood food marketing will have been of service to an estimated 750,000 customers in the Van Nuys area by its fourth anniversary next month.

**Forecast in Bulletin**  
The hexagon design of the building and the interior arrangement of shelving and equipment were originated and designed by the firm's president, Vernon C. Black, who spent several years studying a functional pattern of hexagon or circular design.

The same line of thinking recently was made public by the NARGUS Bulletin, official publication of the National Association of Retail Grocers.

The article was called "Circular Food Store Forecast" and stated that such stores would provide maximum selling space and the most efficient operation.

**Central Warehouse Set**  
The article further quoted architects to the effect that there is 30% more shelf space in a round building than in a square one and customers can see 70% more merchandise on circular shelves.

The management feels it is no longer a forecast as Van Nuys has had probably the first proven market of this type in the United States which will have been in operation for four years this November.

Delamarts will be equipped and controlled from centrally-located warehouse and offices.
