## To File Charges **Next Monday**

In a surprise raid Friday night, Shexiff's deputies picked up \$4000 in dope and nine men and youths described as members of a ring supplying teen-age dope users in this area. Led by Sgt. Jay Stroh, of the Sheriff's narcotics detail, deputies swept down on the nine suspects in two separate raids, one at a bowling center just outside of Torance and in an alley in the 1200 block on Madrid Ave.

Stroh said the raid netted more than 7000 barbituate pills, and a half-pound of marijuana, valued at about \$4000. The raid climaxed five weeks of investigation by members of the narcotics detail and the Torrance police.
