An examination for Rural Carrier for the post office at Palos Verdes Estates will be open for acceptance of applications until Dec. 11, 1956, the Commission announced today. Inasmuch as no qualified eligibles who met the usual residence requirement were obtained as a result of previous examinations announced for this position, persons who reside in territory located within a radius of five miles of the Palos Verdes Estates post office may file applications for this new examination. Applicants must be at least 18 years of age. There is no maximum age limit. However, persons who have passed the age of 70 may be considered only for temporary renewable

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Lomita-Harbor City Wins First Phase of Campaign

Top volunteer leaders in the current Community Chest appeal for harbor area met here for a progress report meeting, headed by Arthur O. Otsea, harbor area campaign chairman, and Edward R. Dale, associated cities chairman.

Individual city progress reports were given for Gardena, Torrance, Harbor City-Lomita, Rolling Hills, Palos Verdes, San Pedro and Wilmington. Harbor City-Lomita holds the lead in gifts to the harbor area Chest goal of \$65,347 with 63.19 per cent or \$1523.55 of its \$2411 quota solicited to date.

Trophy Awarded
The Sam Levy Trophy was temporarily awarded to Harbor City-Lomita, with permanent possession to be given the city first to "go over the top" in meeting its quota goal.

San Pedro has reached 44.08 per cent or \$9190.80 of its \$20,847 quota; Wilmington, 40.58 per cent or \$5870 of its \$14,463 goal; Torrance, 32.73 per cent or \$6056.37 of its \$18,501 goal, and Gardena, 14.64 per cent or \$2290 of its \$15,632 quota.

Percentages and gifts received in Palos Verdes and Rolling Hills are pending outcome of the two residential cities' solicitation.

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Seeks First State Loan

A resolution authorizing an application for \$821,644 for the purchase of nine elementary school sites in the Torrance Unified School District was passed by the Board of Education Tuesday night. The money is sought from the state.

Last month, the voters authorized the application at the same time they approved a 75-cent override tax for the school district. State voters also approved a bond issue of \$100,000,000 for use of the state's school districts.

Sites which would be purchased if the loan was obtained from the state include:

Lincoln School, 10.34 acres southwest of 166th and Arlington; Hamilton School, 10.94 acres south of 182nd St., near Casimir; Yukon School, seven acres near 182nd and Yukon; Columbia School, 11.44 acres near 186th and Prairie Ave.; Madison School, 11.5 acres near 230th and Madison; Calle Mayor School, 11 acres at Calle Mayor and Pacific Coast Hwy., and Adams School addition, two acres near 237th and Ca-brillo.
