City Cuts \$200,000 From Budget, Talks Of Rubbish Charges

The city's proposed 1957-58 budget is several hundred thousand dollars closer to being in balance today after the members of the city council in formal sessions:

1. Agreed that the tax rate would probably have to be raised a little over 1 cent to the maximum \$1 per \$100 of assessed valuation;

3. Slashed bu dg etary requests by about \$200,000 at the first hearing.
