



County officials were instructed to re-open negotiations for the land at a lower cost, since the proposed price was based on the highest appraised value of the land rather than the lowest, and report the results in three weeks.

Supervisor Hahn pointed out that an appraisal of the property by Marshall and Stevens, a nationally-known firm of valuation engineers had established the value of the land at \$808,000, but that the Board of Supervisors had not been informed of the lower figure. A second motion by Supervisor Hahn was approved requiring that all appraisal figures on all future property purchases be reported to the Board of Supervisors.

"I am for the golf course since it would be a valuable recreational asset, but I believe that a discrepancy of \$500,000 between the low and high appraisals is too much to proceed with the purchase," Supervisor Hahn declared.

He suggested that negotiations be opened to purchase the land for the low appraisal of \$808,000 — to be followed by condemnation action if necessary.

Located just south of 190th street between Main St., and Avalon Bivd., the land is now being used as a dump. The dump operator has a lease on the land from the owners — Dominguez estates.

"This is re-claimed land, unsuitable for homes or for industry and the proposed price, which is more than \$6,000 an acre, is entirely too high." Supervisor Hahn stated.

He pointed out that the Western Ave. Golf Course, which was fully developed and improved, had been purchased by the County at a total cost of \$1,100,000.
