Although Torrance Memorial Mospital recently opened a new wing, a shortage of nurses is lampering operations, according to Leonard A. Ensminger, hospital administrator.


Until enough nurses can be obtained, the new surgical floor of the hospital will not be able to function properly, he said. In addition, the shortage has caused considerable overtime among present employees.


