'Friends Around the World' Theme for Scout Day Camp

The camp convenes at 9:30 a.m., with a flag ceremony given by a different unit each day.

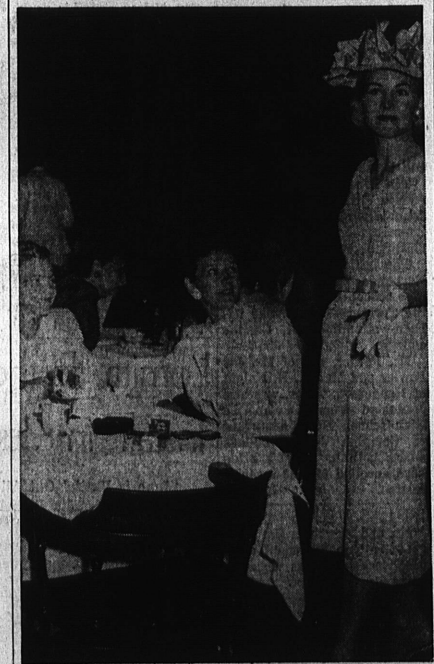
After the ceremony the girls

A reception was held at the Torrance Ward after which the newlyweds left for a northern California honeymoon.

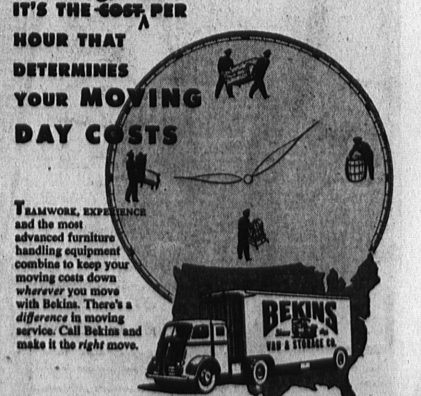
The bride was graduated from Gardena High School in 1956. She was class treasurer and a member of the G.A.A.
