Scouts at Banquet

Fifty-two Explorers from the Los Angeles Area Council and an equal number of leaders were guests of honor Wednesday night (July 24) at a banquet given by the Sears,

Roebuck Foundation at the Ambassador Hotel's Colonial Room.

These boys representing all of the Council's thirteen districts were selected from nominees from each Troop and Post in the Council.

In each district two Junior Leaders, officers of a Troop, and two Elected Leaders who hold positions in an Explorer Post, Ship or Squadron, have been selected for special training at Philmont Scout Ranch in New Mexico.

This is the sixth year of the Junior Leader Training program, and the third for training of elected leaders with both programs under the sponsorship of the Sears, Roebuck Foundation since the beginning.

Austin Cushman, vice president and director of Sears, Roebuck & Co., spoke to the boys encouraging them to learn their lessons well so that they might teach others, thereby fulfilling the plan of enriching every unit in the Council.

Howard B. Barr, Training Chairman of the Council introduced two men who will accompany the boys to Philmont... Jack Worrall, Scoutmaster of Philmont Troop No. 7, and Karl O. Stamm, Advisor of Philmont Post No. 5.

Arnold C. Sorenson, Scout Executive of the Council, gave a brief speech saluting boys, leaders of the future, and the men of today who give leadership to make Scouting possible for boys today.

The Philmont Story was told by John W. Ackermann, Deputy Scout Executive, who told the Explorers some of the wonderful things they will experience on the 127,000 acre ranch in northern New Mexico.

Training conferences will be held in each district next September so that these boys and other members of district training teams may impart their newly mastered skills.

AIR FORCES ANNOUNCE BENEFITS

Recently improved benefits affecting qualified Torrance area veterans re-enlisting in the Air Force have been extended to include the overseas shipment of family household goods.

A new door-to-door system of moving the household belongings, according to T/Sgt. William Valleroy, Room 207, Post Office Building, San Pedro, local Air Force recruiter, is now being utilized in the shipment of household belongings for a least 50 per cent of Air Force families traveling overseas.

This new system, an improvement over the traditional pack-and-crate method, places responsibility for moving each family's goods within the hands of one company.

"Improved overseas travel," said Sergeant Valleroy, "is only one phase of the improvements now being made for Air Force personnel and their families. Many other opportunities, including former grade and pay benefits, re-enlistment bonus either now or later, and choice of Air Force job and base assignments are open to former servicemen qualifying under the Prior Service Program."

TWO POLIO CASES HERE

Seventeen cases of measles were reported in the Torrance health area during the two-week period ending July 20, according to the County Health Department. At the same time, two cases of polio were reported in the city of Torrance.

The local polio cases included a seven-year-old girl and a 41-year-old man. This brings the total in the area to three for the year.

Other diseases reported in the area included tuberculosis, 5; salmonella, 3; and epilepsy, gonorrhea, hepatitis, mumps, and whooping cough, each 2.

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Police Officers Caution Bicyclists To Obey All Traffic Safety Rules

With one fatality already recorded for 1957, Torrance police officers cautioned bicycle riders to obey the safety rules.

"More and more accidents involving bicyclists are occurring," said Traffic Sgt. Don Nash as he cited the one death and numerous other serious accidents that have happened this year.

Traffic safety bulletins stressing bicycling rules are available at the Torrance Police Station, according to Nash.

He also reminded riders to use the following traffic safety suggestions as a guide:

1. Bicycle riders must abide by the same rules and regulations that pertain to operators of motor vehicles.
2. Traffic signals and traffic signs should be obeyed by bicyclists.

... the bike should fit the rider.

5. Single file riding on the right-hand side of the street is safest for bicycle riders... beware of the sudden opening of car doors and cars emerging from driveways and alleys.
6. Ride only one on a bike. The bicycle is not well balanced or controlled when more than one is riding. Two on a bike is one too many.
7. Drivers, be particularly alert for the actions of bicycle riders.
