retroactive—dated all the way back to his first day as a civilian.

But if an ex-serviceman waits beyond a year from date of discharge to apply, the best the VA can do is start payments from the date of the application.

Mrs. Evans reiterated that any veteran, old or new, may be entitled to regular monthly compensation payments for injuries or aliments which were incurred in, traceable to, or aggravated by military service. The amount, of course, depends on how severe the disability happens to be. It must be rated at least 10 per cent disabling for minimum compensation to be payable.

Dependents Aided Veterans who are 50 percent or more disabled may draw additional amounts for their dependents.

To be eligible for compensation, ex-Gi's must have been discharged under other than dishonorable conditions, and the disability must not be the result of misconduct. Further information can be obtained at 1622 Gramercy Ave., Torrance. This is a Community Chest Sponsored Agency.

There's no deadline for a veteran to request compensation for a service - connected disability, but there's an added dollars-and-cents incentive to promptness for the veteran who has just laid his uniform aside.

"If you are disabled when you come out of military service," said Mrs. Sara R. Evans, director of the Torrance Area Veterans Service Center, "it will pay you to file a compensation request within one year from the date of your discharge."

Retroactive Payment
She explained that, if the Veterans Administration approves a veteran's compensation request within the first year, payments can be made retroactive—dated all the way back to his first day as a civilian.
