Rest Periods Editor, HERALD, I have noted some quotes in the papers regarding As-sembly Bill No. 2835 which provides a "rest period" in incorporation procedure. There seems to be some at-tempt to give the impression that this was a secret put over by anti-incorporation forces in Lomita and that it was done to facilitate annexa-tion to Torrane. Last February 21st an As-sembly Com mittee held a public hearing in Lomita to receive recommendations for changes in laws on both in-corporation and annexation. This meeting was attended in force by incorporation pro-moters and was given wide ublicity. On behalf of the Lomita Civic League I made some remittee and after re ad in fitme, filed a written copy with the committee. These were afterwards put into leg-islative form by them. A ver-batim copy of my recommen-ditions on a nexation of both inhabited and uninhabit ed territory is attached here-to. Note they ask the same "rest period" for annexation also that they require an nexation petitions to bis sinstead or registered voters as at present.

as at present. Promoters of incorporation, who claim to be deathly afraid of annexation, gave no support whatever to these recommendations or to the legislation embodying them. If they wanted protection against an nexation they should have supported this legislation at Sacramento. They did not do so. The reasons are obvious. They know that annexation is not a threat in Lomita: that Torrance has not an-nexed an inch of Lomita ter-ritory in the last thirty years. Torrance officials know that Lomita would, be a tax liabili-ty, they do not want us, and have declared publicly that they are not trying to get us. Promoters are makiing des-perate att that it has been thoroughly exposed and is worn threadbare. They keep saying Torrance has repeat-edy chewed off pieces of Lomita: but we notice they very carefully refrain from telling what pieces have been taken, and the reason is, there arent any. L. E. ed Territory. Since it is prop-erty and not people, it is annexed, the law should be amended to require that prop-erty owners only should sign a petition for annexation to a city, instead of registered vot-ers as at present. It is recommended that the protection period provided in Section 35113 of the Govern-ment Code, be extended from 50 days to 60 days.

Section 35114 should be amended to provide that the required signatures must be secured within a period of 60 days from the date of the first signature secured there-on. It should provide further that if the signatures are not obtained, no petition for the same territory to the same city shall be circulated for a

period of three years. It is recommended that Section 35134 of the Govern-Section 35134 of the Govern-ment Code relating to suc-cessive annexation elections, be amended to provide an interval of three years in-stead of 12 months at present. The arguments here are the same as for incorporation, namely, that when the com-munity has decided the issue it should not be subject to constant harrassment by re-peated altermpts to annex.

It should not be subject to constant harrassment by re-peated attempts to annex. ANNEXATION. Uninhabit-ed Territory. Section 35313 of the Gov-ernment Code provides that if protest is made against an-nexation in accordance with that section "Further proceed-ings shall not be taken." If this means that only one attempt can be made and if it fails the city is forever precluded from making an-other attempt upon its own motion, we are satisfied with the section-the way it stands. If, however, additional at-

tempts can be made, it should be amended to provide a three years before any addi tonal attempt can be made.
