

HARBOR JC TELLS FALL SCHEDULE

Registration for the fall semester at Harbor Junior College will continue during the week in September, with the exception of Labor Day, and on Monday, Sept. 16, according to William H. McMasters, dean of admissions and guidance.

Specific registration dates are as follows: Aug. 26-Sept. 6, day and evening college. All day and evening college will be held during the hours from 8 a. m. to 3 p. m., plus the hours from 6 p. m. to 8 p. m. on Sept. 16 only.

Over 400 courses in the seven divisions of the college will begin Tuesday, Sept. 17. All courses are tuition-free, carry regular college credit, and will be offered during the hours from 8 a. m. to 10 p. m. Mondays through Fridays. A complete schedule of all classes is available and may be obtained by calling at the college.

Major fields of study in which day and evening classes will be offered include psychology, theater arts, chemistry, physics, mathematics, printing, English, technology, calculating machines, architectural drawing, painting, typewriting, speed reading, public speaking, electronics, electricity, economics, surveying, Spanish, music, anthropology, police science, vocational nursing, photography, education, and many others.

Guidance Exams
Guidance examinations, required of all persons planning to enroll for a full-time college course, will be given Tuesday, at 9 a. m.; Wednesday, Sept. 4, at 1 p. m.; Monday, Sept. 16, at 1 p. m., and Thursday, Sept. 19, at 1 p. m.

Any person capable of profiting from attending college, who is 18 years of age or older, or a high school graduate under 18, is eligible to attend Harbor Junior College, which is fully accredited for veterans, for transfer students and for technical trainees.

Senator States Vigilance Gets Money to County

Los Angeles County will benefit from the allocation of a sizeable share of state funds as a result of measures sponsored by county legislators during the recent session and now approved by the Governor. In view of the fact that Los Angeles County representatives are badly outnumbered, especially in the Senate where they represent the county's large population, it requires considerable vigilance and effort to make sure that our area gets its fair share of state expenditures.

It was through the exercise of such vigilance that Los Angeles County representatives in the Assembly succeeded in amending an allocation of more than two and a half million dollars for beach and park development within the County.

The original bill, by a Senator representing a predominantly rural area, was intended to benefit only one park in the northern part of the state, but before approving the bill in the Assembly members of that house inserted provisions that apply to other areas as well. Two million of the total amount allocated to the Los Angeles County through the Division of Beaches and Parks will be expended for the acquisition and development of lands to be added to the existing Santa Monica Beach State Park. The remainder will be re-allocated to other park or recreation projects in this community.

Three of my own bills will also bring considerable sums of state money to local projects in other categories, all of them in response to the growing needs of our rapidly expanding metropolitan area.

One of them, SB 86, completes the program begun two years ago with my bill to establish a neuropsychiatric clinic in connection with the Medical Center at UCLA. At that time \$7,000,000 was appropriated for this purpose, and the recent enactment of SB 86 authorizes the Department of Mental Hygiene to go ahead with the actual construction.

North American Receives New Plane Contract

Fabrication of tooling for wing leading-edge assemblies of B-52 strategic bombers this week was awarded to North American Aviation's Los Angeles Division by Boeing Aircraft.

The time and material subcontract, which was negotiated by representatives from Boeing's Wichita plant and North American's office of Plans and Programs, is scheduled to take effect immediately.

North American's Los Angeles Division has previously been awarded sub-contracts from other airframe and missile contractors, including North American's Columbus, Ohio Division, for the T2J and other aircraft production.

Due to cancellation of the government's contract with North American for production of the Navaho missile, some 7300 workers were laid off recently. However, further expected lay-offs have not materialized as North American received other contracts.

Free Hunting Licenses Set For Some Vets

Veterans 70 per cent or more disabled in wartime service may get free hunting licenses, fishing license, deer tags and pheasant tags on or after the Sept. 11th effective date of a new state law.

According to Mrs. Sara Evans, director of Torrance Area Veterans Service Center, they may apply for the licenses now.

Heretofore, the free hunting and fishing privilege was available only to 100 per cent disabled veterans. The law making this privilege more liberal becomes operative Sept. 11.

"To qualify for the licenses and tags," said Mrs. Evans, "veteran applicants will need proof of an honorable discharge from the service and a certificate from the Veterans Administration (dated within the last six months) stating the degree of disability and that it is service-connected."

These are sport licenses only—not for commercial purposes. For further information inquire at 1622 Gramercy Ave., Torrance.
