

## Board Approves Registration For Bond Vote

High schools were one of the main topics of discussion at the Torrance Roard of Education meeting Tusday night, with plans made for purchase of a site for a fourth high school and additions to two existing plants. The board also made application for \$1.781.574 from the state building funds for construction of Magruder. Hamilton, and Columbia Elementary Schools.

Proceedings Begin
The board officially started condemnation proceedings on a 40-acre site between Henrietta and Victor Sts. and between Del Amo Blvd. and Spencer St. This will be used as the site of West High School, scheduled for construction in two or three years. It will be the city's fourth high school. Plans for the second unit at South High, which isn't yet complete, were approved by the board and authorization was given to advertise for bids. The unit will include a gymnasium, two wings of classrooms, and improvement on the site. It will cost about \$1.000.000.
Preliminary drawings for the fourth unit of construction at North High School also were approved, with work on the final drawings authorized. This unit, also to cost about \$1.000.000.
