

Torrance Basketballers Tip Fremont 68-64 in Thriller

Sparked by lanky Gene Crenshaw's 39-point effort, Torrance High's entry in the annual Compton Summer Basketball League bested the Fremont All-Stars 68-64, last Friday night on the Compton High School hardwood.

A 22-point barrage on the winners basket in the final quarter finally broke through the thin lead Fremont had held all through the game.

The losers took an early 23-21 lead at the end of the first period of play, but the locals tied the count at 37-37 by halftime.

Close Match
In the third stanza, Russ Vanderpool, half of the twin-brother combination, hit for

seven of the team's nine points, but the All-Stars tallied 10 to hang on for a one-point advantage when the third quarter buzzer sounded, leaving the score at 47-46, setting the stage for the wild and woolly fourth.

Russ wound up with a total of 18 points, while brother Ray, who fouled out early in the final period, contributed six to the Tartars' cause. Harlan Treskes potted five, to give the locals their 68 total.

The win was the Tartars' fourth in a row, giving them a final league mark of 5 and 1. They lost only to Jefferson High, "home" of Billy McGill, who stands 7 feet up in the clouds.

Tuesday the team entered the league play-offs, with the first game scheduled against Jefferson High at Compton.
