# **Cardinal McIntyre** To Dedicate Church

The new St. Catherine Laboure Catholic Church in north Torrance will be formally dedicated to the service of God by His Eminence J. Francis Cardinal Mc-

The reinforced concrete church, recently com-pleted, is of contemporary architecture. The altars are of Italian marble. The statues and stations of the Cross, of hand-carved wood, are also from Italy. The great stained glass window facade displays numerous symbols of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

St. Catherine's parish was established just 10 years ago this month. The first masses were held in a roller-dome in Lawndale by the late Father Patrick Master-son, the first pastor. He purchased the present prop-erty, including an old winery and house, which were converted into a temporary church and rectory.

Since that time, under the guidance of the present paster, Fr. Raymond J. Tepe, a concrete school of 13 classrooms, a convent for 10 teaching sisters, and the new 900-capacity church have been added.

This historic date in the life of the parish comes on the Feast of Christ the King, reminding all of the brotherhood of man in the Fatherhood of God, Father Tepe said.
