

TV Appearance Bring in \$1300 For Youth Band

Some \$1300 has been sent in to the Torrance Area Youth Band fund from all parts of Southern California, since the band's appearance on TV Oct. 27, according to Mrs. W. C. Boswell, publicity chairman. Contributions from other cities has brought the total amount raised to \$13,000—a little over half of the \$25,000 required. Some 100 band members will go to Chicago Dec. 20 for the Midwest Band Clinic, at a cost of \$250 apiece. One

of eight bands chosen, the local musicians are the only group west of the Mississippi so honored. The drive, however, is continuing and Mrs. Clara Conner, citizens chairman, urged residents to send a dollar to "Postmaster, Torrance" to help out with the funds. At the present time, parents of band members are selling candy bars, cookies, and various small projects.

During the past week, Las Vecinas sent a check to sponsor one-band member, according to Treasurer Bernice Arnold. Funds raised to date have come from the efforts of band members, their parents, a citizens committee, and various other organizations. A door-to-door canvass for funds still is continuing in some areas, according to Robert Lewellen, assistant campaign chairman.

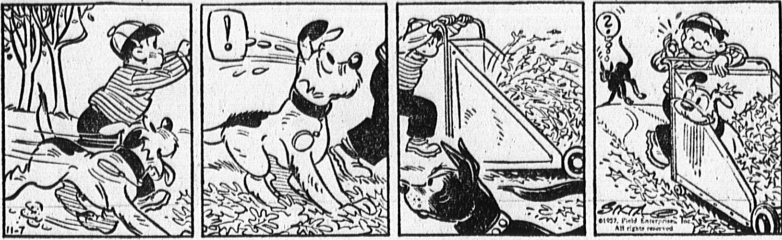

GARDENERS CHECKLIST

November 3-10, 1957

1. Take up any bulbs, corms and tubers which you intend to move or divide next year. This includes dahlias, gladioli, gloxinias, tuberous begonias and canna.
2. Now is planting time for spring blooming bulbs. Don't overlook the advantages of planting certain annuals and perennials as bulb cover.
3. Winter winds and rains can damage some plants unless the gardener, using foresight, stakes and ties his prized possessions.
4. Colorful berried shrubs are wonderful additions to the garden in the fall and winter. Look them over at local nurseries now.
5. Bedding plants, notably stock, violas and pansies, can still be planted.

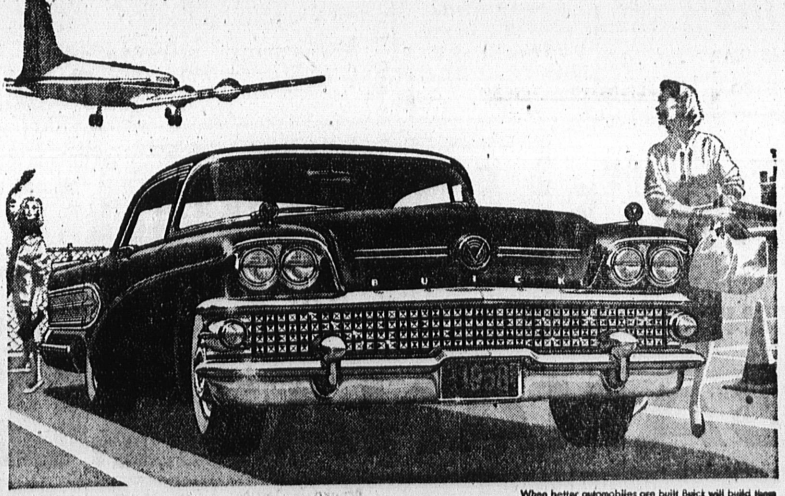
