

## Torrance Colonel Named To Important Army Post

Col. Edward F. Stanford-Blunden, 1702 Schilling Dr., has been appointed Assistant Deputy Commander for Com-

mand Management Affairs on the staff of Maj. Gen. F. N. Roberts, Chief of the California Military District, at Fort MacArthur.

The colonel came to Fort MacArthur in August when he was assigned as a special assistant to the commanding general.

Prior to his assignment here he was Seventh Army Quartermaster in Stuttgart, Germany.

Col. Stanford-Blunden's military career began in 1934 when he received a direct commission in the Army Reserve. He was called to active duty in 1940 at Fort Hamilton, N. Y., and served successfully in the Southwest Pacific area, in New Guinea, and at the Command and General Staff College, Fort Leavenworth, Kan., as an instructor in logistics.

For three years immediately after World War II he supervised the recovery of thousands of war dead from isolated burials and wrecked airplanes throughout Southeast Asia.

At the outbreak of the Korean crisis the colonel became Deputy Commander of the New York Quartermaster Procurement Agency. In 1952 he was assigned as Chief of Staff of the Quartermaster Training Command, Fort Lee, Va.

Born in England, Col. Stanford-Blunden came to the United States shortly before he received his Army commission.

He earned a Bachelor of Arts degree at Santa Tomas University in the Philippines and has done post-graduate work in anthropology at Columbia University.

## HERALD PUBLISHER AT NIKE FIRING PRACTICE

Ten civilian dignitaries from the Harbor and Orange County area, including HERALD Publisher King Williams, traveled to Fort Bliss, Tex., this week to see two of the Nike guided missile units which defend Los Angeles area fire the Nike missile at annual service practice.

As guests of Brig. Gen. Willis A. Perry, commander of the 47th Antiaircraft Artillery Brigade, the group will participate in what the Army calls "Operation Understanding."

General Perry said, "The operation is one under which we invite local civic and business leaders to travel to the Red Canyon Nike firing range, a part of Fort Bliss. While there our local units fire Nike at drone targets and we are able to show these leaders the effectiveness of Nike. This is not a special show, but a regular annual service firing practice for these units."

The two Nike batteries traveling to Red Canyon this week are the Garden Grove and Point Fermin (San Pedro) Battery Nike Sites.
