PINEAPPLE CHEESE CAKE
20 graham crackers 2 eggs
3 lg. pkgs. cream cheese 1 small can pin

20 graham crackers 2 eggs

1 square butter 1 tsp. vanilla
Pre-heat oven to 250 degrees. Roll and crush 20
Graham crackers then add 1 square butter mixing well together. Put in large flat pyrex dish, pat down and bake for 5 minutes.

Take three large packages cream cheese, ½ cup sugar,
2 eggs and cream together. Fold in 1 small can crushed
pineapple (drained) and spread on top of crumb crust and
bake for 15 minutes.

Take out and spread with 1 pint sour cream, 2 tea-

spoons sugar, 1 teaspoon vanilla mixed together. Bake for 15 minutes more. When almost cool, sprinkle top with nut-

meg.

This recipe will serve 15 to 20 persons following a meal as it is very rich, explained Mrs. Youngken.
