PRESIDENT REPORTS

Local Plant to Become Focal Point in West

The new plant of West Virginia Pulp and Paper Co. established here in mid-1958 will one day be the focal point for production of grocery bags, supermarket checkout bags, shopping bags and corrugated shipping containers for West Coast markets, President David L. Luke indicated this week in the company's annual report to stockholders.

The local plant, located on Maple Ave, north of the civic center, is the company's first manufacturing operation west of the Rockies, and is one of four multiwall bag operations established during the past year, Luke reported.

Overall operation of the company during 1958 showed the total sales for the year at a new high of \$208,109,000, although earnings were slightly lower than the preceding year.
