

Community Chest Role in Recent Disaster Revealed

When disaster strikes, such as the fire that so recently leveled more than 60 Topanga Canyon homes, Community Chest dollars often play a silent supporting role.

Because emergencies are a common experience with the Salvation Army, the part played by the San Pedro Corps, with the help of Community Chest financing, has just now come to light.

As revealed by Glenn Koger, Torrance industrial executive serving the Harbor Area as Chest campaign chairman, Capt. Harlan Hall, of Santa Monica Salvation Army Corps, called on Capt. Herman H. Smith, commandant of San Pedro and Wilmington Corps, for help in the courageous relief program he directed at the fire scene.

ASSISTED BY Edwin Harding and James Smith, of the San Pedro Corps, and Lieut. Hope Guernsey, of the independent Redondo Corps, Capt. Smith manned mobile canteens serving fire fighters, from the Topanga command center to the outer reaches of the fire front.

From its administrative center, the Salvation Army provided approximately \$1800,

from an emergency fund depending on the Los Angeles Area Community Chest for 34 per cent of its support. Capt. Warren Johnston, area supervisor of emergency, also gave active aid to fire victims.

Capt. Smith, Koger reported, was one of the most active and effective workers in the 1958 Community Chest fund appeal, as a member of the San Pedro advance gifts committee, and in the agency participation program.

BESIDES its relief program, which last year received \$31,500 from Los Angeles Community Chest, Koger cited Salvation Army Red Feather services including, among others, family relief, day nursery, Red Shield youth clubs, Booth Memorial Hospital, its General Corps and eight local corps.

Chest allocation for the General Corps for the 1958-59 fiscal year is \$46,224. San Pedro Corps received \$3360, nearly 27 per cent of its total budget. Wilmington Corps received \$1980, better than 46 per cent of its total income for the year.

"These," Koger pointed out, "are among 167 health and welfare services working for us every day in the year."

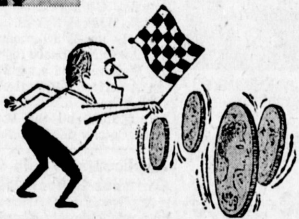

Associated with Dr. Tarr are two other dentists, Dr. Phillip Freeman and Dr. Harvey Gold, four nurses, and three lab technicians.

Marine Corps. Aviation Cadet Program Begins

After a lapse of 17 years, the Marine Corps resumed training of its own aviators Jan. 1 under a program identical to that given Naval Aviation Cadets, according to an announcement made today by Capt. Thomas Kalus, assistant inspector-instructor, at the Marine Corps Reserve training center in Long Beach.

Candidates are required to be between the ages of 18 and 25, have completed two years of college, and be unmarried. Upon receiving their commission as second lieutenants, they must contract for three years of active duty as officers.
