2 eggs
2 lemons, juice
and grated rind
Melt sugar and butter. Then mix lemon juice and rind and 2
eggs together in a bowl. Steam mixture until it thickens. Keep
in jars in refrigerator until needed.
Use favorite short crust recipe for the pastry shells. Bake at
425 to 450 degrees, pricking well with a fork first. When cool,
fill with the lemon cheese.

4 oz. flour
2 oz. margarine
2 oz. margarine
pinch of salt
Cream fat and sugar until soft and white. Add flour gradually
beating well between each addition. Shape into a lump with
fingers. Turn on a lightly floured board, knead slightly until
smooth. Turn over and roll out lightly. Cut the dough into
fancy shaped portions. Bake in a moderately hot oven on a
cookie sheet for 20 minutes. When cooked, shortbread is firm
and golden brown.
