assessor raised the values of their homes this year, the insurance companies were canceling out policies on the grounds that the risk of loss was too great.

POSSIBILITY of a court case in the matter was indicated when councilmen hesitated to appropriate the funds which might be held an expenditure of public monies for private purposes.

"If we can pump out and sand bag other areas during emergencies, I don't see why we can't spend some money to save these homes," Bradford said.

Probable course of action will be for Finance Officer Jerome I. Scharfman to refuse to issue a warrant for the expenditure, and the matter could then be taken to court. A court determination of the liability of the councilmen would clear the way for the project, if the judgment favored the city's action.

water main system in the area.

TORRANCE HAS large lines, including a 24-inch main in Crenshaw Blvd., in the area and could provide an adequate service in the area at a minimum cost.

"The county is in no better position than we are," he said. Residents of the area have been meeting with representatives of County Water District No. 13 to get figures on joining the county system.

EARL BABCOCK, manager of the mutual water company, said the system was built as an irrigation district, and that many of the lines were not adequate for the area. He estimated that possibly 20 per cent of the system was below the legally required pressure. And he admitted that his company had no program to increase the pressure.

Fire Chief J. J. Benner said there was not enough water in the system to give ample fire protection to the homes in the area. He said it was his opinion that his department could not handle a major conflagration there. It would require larger mains, larger hydrants, and more pressure to provide adequate protection.

"YEARS AGO when we went out on an oil derrick fire, we considered the derrick a loss if the fire had climbed very high on the structure," Benner said.

The previous day, a report indicating that Narbonne Ranch Water Co. No. 2, which serves only a small portion of Torrance, and much of north Lomita, had not made improvements it promised four years ago was taken under submission by a Public Utilities Commission examiner.

The hearing was continued again until March 2 when it was indicated that Examiner Grant Sphers would demand an up-to-date report on ownership of the firm.

The PUC investigation was ordered last fall after water users had complained of the poor service.

THE CAFETERIA at the new Hamilton school will be delayed in opening, school officials said. Because of hazards in the Hamilton attendance zone, bus transportation will be provided for students living east of Arlington Ave. and south of 182nd St. Bus stops have been established at 182nd and St. Andrews, 182nd and Western, and 186th and Western.

Boundaries for the new schools were set up to provide for future student population changes, and for the opening of the new Lincoln School at 2410 W. 168th St., scheduled later this year. The new Lincoln School will help ease double session problems at the Casimir school.

Additions also are scheduled at Edison, Arlington, Lincoln, and the new Madison School at 176th and Doty Ave.
