**FRUITS and VEGETABLES**

The rains came to southern California, but farmers pray for more. Oak Glen apple growers, for instance, say they still have good, crisp, hard apples for those visitors who go to that winter wonderland. But they also say, "Pray for rain. We need it . . . there is always that next crop coming up."

San Diego County reports a big crop of winter avocados . . . Fuertes. Harvest expected to peak in March, but the lovely fruit is plentiful now. You'll find top quality avocados at most reasonable prices.

As usual, the weather story is not all bad. Warm, dry January gave San Diego County tomato growers a chance to set new production records. They also report that early spring acreage is expected to be the largest in history. So, look forward to happy tomato eating. Also, the desert crop of asparagus . . . from around Borrego . . . is scheduled to come off in volume about mid-February. The first spears were cut about a month ago, but like all early crops the price is in the
