





The last of the three cows was brought out of the catch-basin of the subterranean flood water conduit located at Plaza Del Amo and Martina Ave. shortly before noon Sat-urday. An "A" frame was used to hoist them out after they were finally coaxed into the open area.

THE BOVINES, belonging to Francisco Pires, 21417 Ber-endo, wandered into the open-ing of the drain at Western and Torrance Bivd. Late Fri-day afternoon. When he missed them at his usual roundup time, Pires called Torrance police and asked for help.

Torrance police and asked for help. Aided by a map of the course of the storm drain fur-nished by office of the Los Angeles County Flood Control. Robert Corrao and Don Carl-son, members of the South Bay Humane Society rescue team, were able to go below a block from the point where the cows were huddled in the drain. After working most of the night and still unable to get the last of the frightened beasts out, the two men had to give up and wait for day-light to continue their operalight to continue their opera-tion. Lack of oxygen handi-capped their work during the night, Corrao said.
