

THE RUSSIAN language is not considered as easy to learn as the more commonly-offered French, German and Spanish, since it has 32 letters, has a variety of case endings not common in English, and uses the Cyrillic Alphabet, which is quite different from the English.

For instance, although the word "student" is pronounced nearly the same in Russian as in English, to the American reader it appears to be spelled "emydemm."

Despite its difficulty, the students seem to be quite interested, Magner reported. The club has drawn several new members since the sessions began last month.

b URING A recent visit to the school, Dr. Ali Naghi Fassa, president of the Academy of Asia in Teheran, Iran, complimented Mrs. Rydelek on hermastery of foreign languages.

He said that in Russian and other languages, her pronunciation was nearly flawless. This, he said, is not common for Americans or for any person trying to speak another language.

"Americans frequently are criticized for failing to speak other people's languages," declared Assistant Superintendent Albert Posner. "It is true that European schools place more emphasis on foreign languages than American schools. But, until 'Sputnik,' we had a hard time trying to get students to take any more than the required foreign language for college. The trend since then, however, seems to be changing. We are glad to offer courses which seem to fit the needs of our students. This Russian Club is a step in that direction."
