A consensus of opinion was reached by the League favoring adequate school financing for both operating expenses and building needs to promote an educational program sufficient to the needs of the community. As a result of this consensus, the League of Women Voters of Palos Verdes Estates has taken a stand in favor of passage of the school bonds for the Palos Verdes school district in the March 31 election.
