amount of information.
Householders will be asked
to name all persons residing

race, and age at last birthday.
All information gathered is
confidential and statistics about
individuals are never released,
he said.

SOME evening calls may be necessary to assure that everyone is contacted, he said.
City Manager George, Stevens, who recommended the special count to the council, has said the city population will probably reach the magic 100,000 mark in this tally. The last census made in November, 1957, showed a population of 93,372.
