FLYING SAUCERS

FLYING SAUCERS
(A Chewy Cookie)
shortening s sugar 1½ tsp. Baking Soda s sugar 1 tsp. cinnamon 1 tsp. allspice 1½ tsp. salt 11/s cups shortening 21/4 cups sugar 244 cups sugar
1 tsp. allspice
15 cup Honey
14 cup milk
14 cup milk
14 cup raisins
3 cups rolled Oats
(sifted)

Cream sugar and shortening thoroughly. Beat in eggs. Add honey and blend well. Sift flour with spices, baking soda and salt. Alternate with the milk—beginning and ending with the flour, when adding to the creamed mixture. Fold in raisins & rolled oats.

Scoop out about ½ cup of batter for each cooky on a lightly oiled cooky sheet, allowing about 4 inches between cookies for spreading. Flatten to a ¾ inch pat. Bake at 350° for 20 minutes. For a chewy cooky, bake slightly underdone. For a crispy cooky, bake until just done. Loosen from cooky sheet while still warm, but cool on pan. Yields 1½ dozen 5-inch cookies. 11/2 dozen 5-inch cookies.
