### PROTEIN FOODS

Beef, Pork and Lamb are quite comparable in supply and price. Poultry (chickens and turkeys) continue holding the lead as economy foods. The "three dearest of things," according to a Scotch proverb, "are hen's eggs, pork, and woman's praise." A practical German maxim goes, "A slice of ham is better than a fat pig in a dream." Either of those proverbs might be called the slogan of the week.

Eggs are not "dear" in the sense of expensive. To the contrary they are holding at such low prices that our market man says the price is "ridiculous" . . . lower than they have been in the last 15 or 20 years. And while producers and suppliers might consider the price "ridiculous" we consumers go on making the most of a good bargain and figure more ways to serve eggs.

Let's look at the traditional companion to eggs, ham . . . another of the "dearest" things. Although the peak season for pork is tapering off many bargains are available. Apparently we've cleaned up the "picnics," and this week some markets are "specializing" hams.

Buy a whole or part ham. Stretch it by using some with eggs. Cook some of it with beans. Have you had Ham and Lima lately? A wonderful meal with dark bread, green salad, and maybe fresh strawberries for dessert. **LEAVE IT TO THE IRISH!** The Irish consume the most
