

# Posting, Protesting Procedure For Beverage Licenses Outlined

 The Legislative Counsel on  
 May 22, 1959, issued his Opin-  
 ion No. 15486, regarding the  
 posting, publication, and pro-  
 testing regarding the issuance of  
 alcoholic beverage licenses,  
 which I quote because it an-  
 swers many questions I have  
 received from readers of this  
 newspaper:

"Dear Mr. Chapel:  
 Pursuant to your request,  
 the following information  
 pertains to the posting and  
 publication requirements for  
 the issuance of alcoholic be-  
 verage licenses and the pro-  
 visions authorizing protests to  
 the issuance of such licenses.

Section 23985 of the Busi-  
 ness and Professions Code  
 provides that within five days  
 after filing an application to  
 engage in the sale of any al-  
 coholic beverages at any pre-  
 mises, notice of such in-  
 tention shall be posted in a  
 conspicuous place at the en-  
 trance to the premises and  
 that no license shall be issued  
 for the premises until the no-  
 tice has been posted for at  
 least 30 consecutive days.  
 Such notice is required to be  
 in such form as prescribed by  
 the Department of Alcoholic  
 Beverage Control. Notice for

the application for a license for premises under construction shall be posted at the proposed premises within five days after the application is filed and shall remain posted for at least 30 consecutive days.

"Section 23986 of the Business and Professions Code provides that any applicant for an on-sale license shall within 10 days after filing the application cause a notice of the application, giving the name or names of the applicant and the premises where the business is to be conducted, to be published for one

time in a newspaper of general circulation in the city in which the premises are situated, or if the premises are not in a city, the publication shall be made in a newspaper of general circulation nearest the premises where the business is to be conducted. The form of the notice shall be prescribed by the Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control and an affidavit of the publication must be filed with the department prior to the issuance of any license.

"Section 24013 of the Business and Professions Code provides that protests to the

issuance of alcoholic beverage licenses may be filed at any office of the Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control within 30 days from the first date of posting the notice of intention to engage in the sale of alcoholic beverages.
