#### City Drops Plastic Bag Label Law

The city council this week dropped plans to enact an ordinance requiring labels on plastic bags warning of their danger to children.

The proposal was withdrawn after it was reported that the state legislature was considering a statewide bill on the subject, and that the dry cleaning industry—principal users of the plastic bags—had taken steps to have the bags labeled on their own initiative.

Requests for such an ordinance were received after a small Andra Park tot died in one of the garment bags on May 12. More than 20 such eaths have occurred throughout the nation during recent months.
