Need for Greater Citizen Voice in Government Told

Assemblyman Vincent Thomas of San Pedro declared in Sacramento this week that the present session of the Legislature underscores the need for greater citizen participation in State Government.

"Legislation of vital importance in the everyday lives of every citizen of California has come before the present session, and will continue to come until adjournment on June 29."

Thomas said.

"This includes not only the bills that are extremely important to the local districts, but measures that affect the future of the entire State, such as bills concerning the economy, new taxes, our long hoped for solution of the water problem, and others."

ALL OF these, Thomas said, are keyed to the higher than ever budget proposed for the present session, sand where through of greater citizen participation activities at the local level; the witting of letters to newspapers, State officials and departments, and elgislators; and visits to the Capitol when possible.

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
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
