year 1958-1959 that number of enlisted men will be enrolled in civilian institutions of high-er learning four-year courses leading to a degree of bachelor of science and to commissions in the Navy. Dur-ing summer vacation periods, the students will be assigned to Navy laboratories and other scientific establishments to study a pplication of the sciences. sciences
