Board Approves Alondra Park's **Building Plans**

With major improvements With major improvements now under construction at the south part of Alondra Fark, progress is also being made toward the second phase of developing the northwest section of the park, Supervisor Kenneth Hahn reported this week as the Board of Supervisors approved schematic plans for approved schematic plans for a large recreation - activity building.

Former site of a veterans housing unit, which had served its purpose, the northwest por-tion of the park had never tion of the park had never been developed or improved for public use until last spring when Supervisor Hahn suc-ceeded in having the 13 acre site developed, landscaped and three baseball diamonds built.

Facilities Listed

Plans for the combined rec-reation-activity building call for

"This fine new building will be both beautiful and practical and will meet a need which has long existed for expanded recreational activities for the people using Alondra Park," Hahn declared.

He pointed out that the building can be used for a va-riety of purposes, including meetings of civic organizations, veterings of cryst youth groups, veteran groups, youth groups, square dancing, as well as the regularly scheduled and supervised recreation and craft pro-grams.

Improvements now being made, and those planned for Alondra Park are in line with Supervisor Hahn's program to develop the park into one of the finest regional recreational centers in Southern California.

Serves Wide Area

Located between Manhattan Beach and Redondo Beach Blvds., Dominguez Channel and Prairie Ave., Alondra Park serves the people of a wide area including south Los Angeles, Gardena, Hawthorne, Inglewood, Lennox, Lawndale, Torrance, Redondo Beach, Moneta Gardens, Howard townsite and adjacent communities.

Construction work now going on at the south end of the park, near the swimming pool and lake will provide a bathhouse, major improvements to the lake, additional parking, park lighting, and a specially designed children's playground, which should prove one of the park's major attractions.
