- 2. Roses and many other deciduous shrubs and trees are in stock in quantity at nurseries now that bare root season has arrived. New rose varieties should be ordered as soon as possible in case supply runs short.
- 3. Deciduous fruit and nut trees may be pruned
- 4. First plantings of gladiolus may be made now. Careful spacing of planting through the winter will result in continuous beauty.
- 5. Now is planting time for berry and grape vines, rhubarb and asparagus.
