#### Telephone Expansion Plans Told

An allocation of nearly \$11.5 million for improvements in the Redondo, Palos Verdes and Rolling Hills central exchanges of the General Telephone Co., during the next two years has been announced by H. C. Vaupel, manager of the FRontier number area for the company.

Budget for 1958 is \$6,407,000 Vaupel said, while the 1959 budget allocates \$5,057,000 for the area. An allocation of nearly \$11.5

the area.

Largest single item in the budget this year is \$2,874,000 for central office automatic switching equipment in Redondo, he reported.

New automatic tick eting suipment is scheduled to go

New automatic ticketing equipment is scheduled to go into operation next April, accounting for much of the equipment expenditure.

A new one-story and partial addition to the existing central facilities of Rolling Hills is planned, and automatic toll ticketing and other equipment installed.

Telephones in the Redondo exchange now number about 63,000, Vaupel said. He anticipates an additional 8750 phones during 1958.
