"One of the chief reasons
Japanese women are so fond
of American men is because
our men treat women with respect and as equals.

"In Japan, women are sub-servient to men in all ways. They must remain in their homes. Even when the men at-

homes. Even when the men attend conventions or parties, they do not take their wives."

An interesting observation was that Japan is third in the world's list of percentage of literacy. "People swarm to book shops. They read every book they can find in their thirst for knowledge."

Living expenses in Japan are low, but so are wages. More and more women are taking jobs, Mrs. English said. "It's an unusual site in

America to see a woman carry-ing a bucket of cement. But not so in Japan, where women conviewed working along side of

While the Japanese men do not treat their wives as equals, the women are fortunate in one

"They have no worries. they become a widow, their families take them over and provide for them. Families share all their problems and worries.

"In Japan, no woman would be left to provide for herself. In some ways, they feel Americans are hard-hearted toward their families.
